We have an amazing line-up of 14 diverse speakers to talk about the various features, habitats, stressors, and unique happenings going on, on Lake Huron!




With a huge silent auction, a 5 star dinner catered by Oakwood, live musical entertainment, and raffle prizes, this night will be a fun time out for all.

A Snappy Personality: Why did the turtle cross the road?

With the warm weather returning, many of the iconic turtle species found in Lake Huron will soon be on the move. Many people think turtles are cute or unique, but there's one that has bad reputation; the snapping turtle (*Chelydra serpentina*). Despite being one of Lake Huron's most abundant turtle species, snapping turtles have been designated as Special Concern status under Ontario's Endangered Species Act, meaning that their population numbers are declining. Snapping turtles play a critical role in maintaining water quality in lakes and wetlands by eating decaying plant and animal matter, making them a free "wastemanagement system" for some very important ecosystems.

Snapping turtles can be easily identified from other species of turtles by their large body size, prehistoric looking shell that is often covered in algae and their long, spikey tail. Snapping turtles get their reputation from a defensive stance and "snap" when they feel frightened. Unlike other turtle species that can tuck themselves safely inside of their shells, snapping turtles have a reduced plastron (bottom part of their shell) meaning that their soft, squishy belly could be exposed to predators. By snapping at predators, and sometimes humans with good intentions, snapping turtles are able to protect themselves in potentially dangerous situations.

Snapping turtles, in addition to many other turtle species in Lake Huron, travel from the safety of the water to find a suitable place to lay their eggs. These journeys often include crossing roads and highways, putting nesting females at risk of being hit by passing vehicles. If you see a turtle crossing the road, be a turtle crossing guard! Move them in the

direction that they were crossing in and place them safely out of harms way. Snapping turtles require special care when moving due to their large size, claws and snappy personality. They can be firm grasped at the back of their shell and "wheel barrowed" across the road. This reduces the risk to you and to the turtle!
